West Wycombe and the Hell-Fire Caves

HELL-FIRE CAVES

Excavated in 1750 by Sir Francis Dashwood, these caves were used by the "Brotherhood of St. Francis" (generally known as the Hell-Fire Club), a group of rakes who dressed up as Franciscan monks and held orgies and rituals of an indescribable nature.

A large Gothic forecourt marks the entrance to the winding passage which disappears deep into the bowels of the earth. It leads through the Catacombs into the Banqueting Hall, which is said to be the largest man-made chalk cave in the world. Further on, the passage divides and descends abruptly to the Cursing Well and the Inner Temple, reserved for the most intimate rites of the Club.

To wander here in the stygian blackness with a candle is indeed an unforgettable experience.

THE GARDENS

Visitors will delight to roam round the lake (laid out in the shape of a swan) and catch glimpses of hidden temples to the Muses, and romantic walks in the woods. The views are unsurpassed, and are a classic example of 18th century landscape gardening.

THE GOLDEN BALL

The Golden Ball at the top of the hill is known all over the world. It stands 100 feet from the ground; through its portholes is unfurled a remarkable vista of the countryside and on a fine day Harrow-on-the-Hill, 25 miles away, can be seen. The Ball can hold 12 people and it was here that John Wilkes, the celebrated demagogue, Sir Francis Dashwood and the Earl of Sandwich are said to have drunk punch and sung blasphemous songs.

THE HOUSE

The present house was built in 1745 by Sir Francis Dashwood. It is one of the finest examples of Palladian architecture in the country, with its 300 foot double colonnade and exquisite Italian frescoes. The richly decorated ceilings and the collection of paintings, including the notable portrait of Milton recently discovered, are of considerable interest. It is today the residence of Sir John Dashwood.

Highway Robbery in West Wycombe.

ON Saturday, 27th June, West Wycombe will return again to the days of the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries, when stagecoaches were the primary means of long distance transport.

The first event of the village's week of celebrations to mark the Coronation will be a stagecoach hold-up by an armed highwayman—passengers, attendants and highwayman will be dressed in eighteenth century costume.

The coach will start its journey to West Wycombe from the seventeenth century Saracen's Head Inn in Beaconsfield, nine miles away. Arriving at High Wycombe—three miles from West Wycombe village—there will be a halt of some ten minutes outside the Red Lion Hotel to refresh the horses when the passengers, driver, strapper and guard will receive drinks from an ostler.

On board the coach will be the villagers of Chelsea and their ladies who will be using this novel means of transport to complete their journey to West Wycombe for their period cricket match against the villagers of West Wycombe.

Dick Smallwood, who runs a riding school at Radnage, will play the part of Jack Shrimpton, the notorious Buckinghamshire highwayman of the eighteenth century. Dick and his sister Pat regularly hunt with the Old Berkeley Foxhounds.

Buckinghamshire Highwaymen.

BORN at Penn, near Beaconsfield, Jack Shrimpton served an apprenticeship in London; not content, however, to serve a dull, but honest life, he turned highwayman and eventually became one of the most daring robbers of the day. He stopped coaches as they toiled up Dashwood Hill and relieved the passengers of their valuables—it is said that he robbed nearly every coach between London and Oxford. Once near Stokenchurch he robbed a barrister of his horse and fifty guineas. On a trip to London he happened to meet the hangman, when the subject of a long conversation was Jack Shrimpton's prospect of becoming a customer to Jack Ketch. Whatever the hangman may have thought, Shrimpton was at last captured in London convicted of murder and robbery and executed at St. Michael's Hill on Friday, 4th September, 1713.

Another highwayman who frequented the Buckinghamshire countryside was the famous Dick Turpin. When he changed his venue from the Great North Road to Watling Street, Dick made his headquarters at the Old Swan Inn in Woughton-on-the-Green. It was at this village that he reversed each of his horse's shoes in order to elude his pursuers. Turpin's ghost is reputed to haunt an old road near the Inn on dark nights.

YE LAWS OF YE GAME OF CRICKET

Ye pitching of ye first wicket is to be determined by ye cast of a piece of money.

When ye first wicket is pitched, and ye popping crease cut, which muft be exactly three feet ten inches from ye wicket, ye other wicket is to be pitched directly opposite, at twenty-two yards distance, and ye other popping crease cut three feet ten inches before it.

Ye bowling creases muft be cut in a direct line from each stump.

Ye stumps muft be twenty-two inches long, and ye bail fix inches. Ye ball muft weigh between five and fix ounces. When ye wickets are both pitched, and all ye creases cut, ye party that wins ye toss up may order which side shall go in first at his option. Ye bowler muft deliver ye ball with one foot behind ye crease even with ye wicket, and when he has bowled one ball or more, shall bowl ye number of *four* before he changes wickets, and he shall change but once in ye same innings. He may order ye player that is in at his wicket to stand on which side of it he pleases at a reasonable distance.

If he delivers ye ball with his hinder foot over ye bowling crease, ye umpire shall call no ball though she be struck, or ye player is bowled out, which he shall do without being asked, and no person shall have any right to ask him. If ye wicket is bowled down its out. If he strikes or treads down, or he falls himself upon his wicket in striking (but not in over-running) its out. A stroke or nipp over or under his ball, or upon his hands (but not arms), if ye ball be held before he touches ground, though she be hug'd to the body, its out.

If in striking both his feet are over the popping crease, and his wicket put down, except his batt is down within, its out. If he runs out his ground to hinder a catch, its out. If a ball is nipp'd and he strikes her again wilfully before she comes to ye wicket, its out. If the players have crossed each other, he that runs for ye wicket that is put down, is out. If in running a notch, the wicket is struck down by a throw before his foot, hand, or batt, is over the popping crease, or a stump hit by ye ball, though the bail was down, its out. But if ye bail was down before, he that catches ye ball muft strike a stump out of ground, ball in hand, then its out. If ye striker touches or takes up ye ball before she is lain quite still, unless asked by ye bowler, or wicket keeper, its out. When ye ball has been in hand by one of ye keepers or stoppers, and ye player has been at home, he may go where he pleases till ye next ball is bowled. If either of ye strikers is cross'd in his running ground designedly, which design muft be determined by the umpires. N.B. Ye umpire may order the notch to be scored. When ye ball is hit up, either of ye strikers may hinder ye catch in his running ground, or if she's hit directly across ye wicket, ye other player may place his body anywhere within ye swing of ye batt, so as to hinder ye bowler from catching her; but he muft neither strike at her, nor touch her with his hands.

If a striker nippa a ball up just before him, he may fall before his wicket, or pop down his bat, before she comes to it, to save it.

Ye bail hanging on one stump, though ye ball hit ye wicket, its not out. Ye wicket-keepers fhall ftand at a reafonable diftance behind ye wicket, and fhall not move till ye ball is out of ye bowler's hand, and fhall not by any noife incommode ye striker and if his hands, knees, foot, or head, be over or before ye wicket, though ye ball hit it, it fhall not be out. Ye umpires fhall allow two minutes for each man to come in when one is out, and ten minutes between each hand. To mark ye ball that it may not be changed. They are fole judges of all outs and ins, of all fair and unfair play, of all frivolous delays, of all hurts, whether real or pretended, and are difcretionally to allow what time they think proper before ye game goes on again. In cafe of a real hurt to a striker, they are to allow another to come in, and ye perfon hurt to come in again, but are not to allow a frefh man to play on either fide on any account. They are fole judges of all hindrances, croffing ye players in running, and ftanding unfair to ftrike, and in cafes of hindrances may order a notch to be fcored. They are not to order any man out unlefs appealed to by any one of ye players.. Thefe laws are to ye umpires jointly. Each umpire is ye fole judge of all nips and catches, ins and outs, good or bad runs at his own wicket, and his determination fhall be abfolute, and he fhall not be changed for another umpire without ye confent of both fides, When both umpires call play three times, 'tis at ye peril of giving ye game from them that refufe to play.
